# Kiwanis helps with the neighborhood breakfast program.

Eric Ekum talked about the meal programs provided by our School District at our January 7th meeting. The amount of meals provided was eye opening. Our school district and staff have done a phenomenal job.

But do you remember when lunches was all that was provided? A 1999 article rated Wisconsin last in the nation for participation in a breakfast program..

Enter David Mosher and a group of volunteers from Union Presbyterian Church for the 2000 school year. With the help of the Monroe Fund establishing a Neighborhood Breakfast Program fund with a gift of \$675 from Monroe Kiwanis and a \$750 donation from the Salvation army the program began serving children at the Monroe Senior Center. Superintendent (and Kiwanian) Ed VanRavenstein opened the program for Parkside students. The following year it was expanded to include middle school students. Monroe Kiwanis and many other service clubs and churches volunteered to staff a month for two breakfasts per week. My mom Ardath Slater was the one constant volunteering every single week. Key club members were frequent volunteers.



about 25 students from Parkside lementary School in Monroe gather for the vice-weekly breakfasts. Union esbyterian Church in Monroe started the ogram a year ago to provide breakfasts for ildren who may not otherwise get them, d Dave Moser, a volunteer.

## Kiwanis sponsored cub pack and scout troop 101 report by Tami Richardson

We want to begin by thanking Mr. Lee Binkley for being our Kiwanis Charter Representative for both Boy Scout Troop 101 and now Cub Scout Pack 101. We are truly thankful he is willing to fill that position for both groups!

#### Pack 101 report

Cub Scouts Pack 101 is for children Elementary school aged, 5 years to about 10 years, in the Monroe area. Currently we have 24 youth members and we are the only Cub Scout Pack serving our town. 2020 had a lot of challenges for our group but we found a way to still serve families and their children. While locked down, we encouraged families to work on their Cub Scout's book together as a fun activity. Several Cub Scouts were able to achieve their rank patch by doing this, we are so proud of them and their family!

Once back to school began, we were able to have some indoor meetings in groups of 10 or less while practicing social distancing. These then became outdoor meetings to further protect scout's health. Those who were not comfortable with meetings were given a plan to follow at home with their Cub Scout. We also had a fall hike at Forest Prairie Park in groups of 10 with social distancing.


Once it got too cold for Cub Scouts to meet outside, a plan was given to Cub Scout families to work on at home. We had a winter hike at Honey Creek Park with a sign up online so we could keep to groups of 10 and the whole family could come out if wanted. We have also given out Pinewood Derby Cars in the hope that the scouts can run them in the spring when it is warm enough outside again. ## Troop 101 report

Boy Scout Troop 101 is for boys in Middle and High School of the Monroe area. (Their sisters of the same age attend Troop 114, also here in town.) We currently have 18 members and are the biggest Monroe Troop. Despite the pandemic, we safety ran "Scouting for Food" this summer which collects food for our Green County Food Pantry. In addition to that service project, several scouts also cleaned trash from the Badger State trail this summer.

Once school began, Troop 101 had indoor meetings in patrols, groups of 10 or less, while practicing social distancing. These also became outdoor meetings which continued in to the cold while the boys learned what to do and how to dress for cold meetings. Eventually their meetings moved online to Zoom or Google Meet. Some patrols played online games while others worked on advancements. All of them have worked on Merit badges and continue to do so. Before it got cold, the scouts brought canoes to Cadiz Park to work on their canoeing skills. They signed up to go in groups of 10 and practiced social distancing. Only one group ended up in the water and they were glad they brought a change of clothes! (It wasn't as warm wet as it had been while they were dry) Thankfully, none of the boys were reported to have gotten sick at a meeting or activity. Thank you for supporting Troop 10!!
