

Kiwanis 'N Cops 'N Kids

Mission: Promoting children's literacy and community trust in law enforcement


Goal: Getting free books into the hands and homes of kids, while also building connection and trust in the community.

How to: There are several models that we are suggesting. You find what works best for your club.

A) Reading at a public spot, a Kids Corner. Picture one scenario, a local Kids Corner where cops read to kids. This could be an outside project. Perhaps, police would meet kids at a park, at a little library, at school or the YMCA. Maybe McGruff would even show up. After a story is read, Kiwanians may want to distribute free books to kids.

B) Kids book drive and distribution. Kiwanians collect gently used books. Maybe enlist the help of your Key Club to collect books, sort them by age and the police hand them out at an event. Books can also be acquired from the Cops'N Kids Reading Center in Racine.

C) Pre-distribute books then have an officer read. Kiwanians pick a specific book and distribute a number of them (50?) through a local group like a day-care center, a YMCA group, Boys & Girls Club... then have an officer read along with the kids – or have the kids read to an officer.




books. Then club can distribute books and families can read along with the officers. You can also post a reading event on your Facebook page, as well as the police department's page.






NAMI Family-to-Family is a free, 8-session education program for family, friends and significant others of adults with mental health conditions. NAMI Family-to-Family provides information about anxiety, depressive disorders, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and other mental health conditions. Other topics covered include communication, problem solving, treatment and recovery.

The course is designed to increase understanding and advocacy skills while helping participants maintain their own well-being.
