The time has come in the Day of Service planning calendar to confirm what sites are interested in participating in the Annual MHS Day of Service. Day of Service (DDS) was created as a way for students to give back to the Monroe Community through community service. This experience also allows us to teach our students what it means to give back to the community and important traits such as *character*, *hard work* and *empathy* towards others. Our students and staff are grateful for the support this community gives them each day and year. DOS has allowed the MHS student body and staff to give over 2000 hours of community service back to our community. Projects that students are engaged in vary from cleaning, painting and landscaping to picking up trash along trails, the highway and west side of Monroe. This annual tradition has become a favorite of students and staff at MHS. This year, we have DOS scheduled to take place on the morning of May 10th with a rain date of May 17th.

As a reminder, each crew consists of 8-14 students and one staff member. If you have significant needs, we can send more than one crew. If you communicate your needs, we can work together to determine your needs and how many crews you will need. It is important to remember that crews will be placed for a 3 hour work window. I am always impressed by how much is accomplished within that time frame. When there is work to be done, students will work hard and fast, especially when around their peers. Projects that may take two volunteers all day to do, this crew will complete in an hour or two. It is best to over plan jobs at your site since HS students being bored is not always fun.



February 29


